
reader and the written text: (iii) the more is <u>God</u>.




Any written text? Or written text that is inspired by God?



- 2Tim 3:16-17, NRSV




What is the connection between the reader, the written text and God? God Sacred Scriptures reader






Why communicate?

- Gen 1:1-3, In the beginning, when God created the heavens and the earth... and God said,...




Why communicate?

M. Casey: The Four Moments of Lectio Divina

| Sense | Faculty | Function | Prayer |
|------------------------------------|------------|-------------------------------------|--------------|
| 1. Literal | Intellect | Understand the written text | Lectio |
| 2. Christological (allegorical) | Memory | Contextualize the text in Christ | Meditatio |
| 3. Behavioral (tropological) | Conscience | Live the Christian meaning | Oratio |
| 4. Mystical (anagogical) | Spirit | Share the mind of God | Contemplatio |

The letter speaks of deeds, allegory to faith, the moral how to act, anagogy our destiny.

Allegorical/Christological Sense

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• How does this word/phrase or character/place remind me of Jesus Christ in the way that he has lived his life?

<u>Behavioral/Tropological Sense</u>

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• How am I, as a Christian, being challenged by the text, and/or by the life of Jesus Christ?

Anagogical/Mystical Sense

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• What have I learned about God? How am I invited to see reality as seen through the eyes of God?

To read the Bible is to encounter Jesus is to live like Jesus is to find oneself being animated by God.

"I would like, in particular, to recall and recommend the ancient tradition of *lectio divina*: the diligent reading of Sacred Scripture accompanied by prayer brings about that intimate dialogue in which the person reading hears God who is speaking, and in praying, responds to him with trusting openness of heart (cf. *Dei Verbum*, 25). If it is effectively promoted, this practice will bring to the Church - I am convinced of it - a new spiritual springtime."
