Sacrament of Baptism. We share in your joy as we
welcome the newest member of your family into God's
family, the Church. Our Parish offers Baptism Prepara-
tion Program to parents, with godparents, who wish to
share their faith with their child. To register, please call
the Parish Office.

Sacrament of Reconciliation. Persevere on the jour-
ney to holiness: Say "No" to sin and "Yes" to God's
love, mercy and forgiveness: **Sunday's after mass, at
St. Mary Magdalene, St. Thomas/St. Jude and on
the 1st Tuesdays of the month at 6:30pm at St. Mary
Magdalene** or call the Parish Office to make an ap-
pointment.

Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. Jesus con-
tinues his healing ministry through his Church. If you
or any parishioner is ill at home, in the hospital or the
nursing home, and desires to celebrate this sacrament
of healing, call the Parish Office to schedule a visit.

Sacrament of the Eucharist. One of our priests will
bring Communion during home visits or Extraordinary
Ministers of Holy Communion (communion ministers)
can and may bring you communion regularly. Call the
Parish Office.

Sacrament of Confirmation. Our young parishioners
who wish to prepare to receive the gift of the Holy Spir-
it in the sacrament of Confirmation must be enrolled in
a 2 year preparation program in Religious Education.
Adults must call the rectory.

Sacrament of Marriage. You and your fiancé are
called to mirror the love of Jesus for his Church! Please

intended date of your wedding so we can help you pre-
pare for this wonderful sacrament of committed love.

Sacrament of Holy Orders. Do pray for vocations to

religious, married, single—in the Church. Now do you

**The Catholic Community of The Blessed Trinity
At St. Jude the Apostle in Red Creek
welcomes Bishop Salvatore Matano!**

The Most Reverend Salvatore R. Matano was born in Providence, Rhode Island on September 15, 1946, the son of Salvatore and Mary Santaniello Matano. He attended St. Ann Elementary School and LaSalle Academy in Providence before enrolling in Our Lady of Providence Seminary College in Warwick, where he earned a Bachelor’s Degree in Philosophy.

He was ordained to the priesthood on December 17, 1971 by James Cardinal Hickey in St. Peter’s Basilica in Rome. He attended the Pontifical Gregorian University in Rome, where he was awarded a Licentiate Degree in Sacred Theology in 1972, and later received a Doctorate in Canon Law in 1983 from that same university.

Bishop Matano served as Assistant Pastor at Our Lady of Grace Parish in Johnston, Rhode Island from 1972-1973. He was also a faculty member of Our Lady of Providence Seminary High School in Providence from 1972-1977. In 1977 he was named Diocesan Director of Priests’ Personnel, while residing at Our Lady of Providence Seminary in Warwick.

In 1980, he also served as Assistant Chancellor for the Diocese of Providence. Between 1980 and 1983, Bishop Matano pursued graduate studies in Rome, after which he returned to the Diocese of Providence, where he served as Vicar for Administration and Co-Chancellor until 1991. During this time, he resided at St. Augustine Parish in Providence.

After a year’s service at the Apostolic Nunciature in Washington, D.C. where he served as Secretary to the Apostolic Nuncio (1991-1992), Bishop Matano returned to the Roman Catholic Diocese of Providence. He was named Vicar General and Moderator of the Curia and served at that post until 1997, when he was appointed pastor of St. Sebastian Parish in Providence until 2000.

The Bishop also enjoyed five years as a Special Lecturer in the Undergraduate and Graduate Departments of Theology at Providence College of the Dominican Fathers, between 1995 and 2000.

In January of 2000, Bishop Matano returned to the Apostolic Nunciature in Washington, D.C. where he served as Secretary to the Apostolic Nuncio until his Ordination as Coadjutor Bishop of Burlington on April 19, 2005.

Bishop Matano was named Prelate of Honor by His Holiness, Pope John Paul II in 1985, and received recognition from the Holy Father again in 1993 when he was named Prothonotary Apostolic.

His Holiness Pope Francis appointed Bishop Matano as the Bishop Designate of Rochester on Nov. 6, 2013. He was installed as the Ninth Bishop of Rochester at a Mass at Sacred Heart Cathedral in Rochester on the afternoon of Friday, January 3, 2014.

Wisdom vs. Information

My Dear People,

John Paul II was Pope from 1978 to 2005. From a historical perspective alone, he accomplished incredible things. Many people credit him as the single most important player in the downfall of Communism. Admittedly, isolating a single defining event is challenging. **However, I believe that one of the most important things he did was promulgate the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*.**

Why was the publication of the Catechism so important? The Pontificate of St. John Paul II spanned a time of great cultural, social, and religious upheaval throughout the world and even within the Church. When the *Catechism* came out, there was a lifeline to the authentic and unchanging teaching of the Church which everyday Catholics could hold on to. What made this important wasn’t just the practical usefulness of having an official, single-volume reference book on Catholic Faith and Morals, but that **it gave ordinary people something becoming more and more rare—wisdom.**

The twentieth century has witnessed the exponential increase of the speed and ease of communication. In other words, information which before could be shared only by printing and books or newspapers or writing letters was now available instantly and across continents. More information was accessible than anytime in human history. But if people had more information available, did they *understand* more?

Here’s where we see the difference between mere information and wisdom. Information is data, ‘facts’, news, but having an endless supply of it doesn’t make your life better. **Wisdom, on the other hand, is ultimately about seeing things the way God sees them, as they truly are.** It is being capable of knowing the pattern for authentic living, understanding what life is all about, what its meaning is, and possessing a roadmap to heaven. The *Catechism* is a book of Truth (capital “T” Truth), for a world that has mistaken information and data for wisdom.

Read the beauty of the opening paragraph: “God, infinitely perfect and blessed in Himself, in a plan of sheer goodness freely created man to make him share in His own blessed life...To accomplish this, when the fullness of time had come, God sent His Son as Redeemer and Saviour. In His Son and through Him, He invites men to become, in the Holy Spirit, His adopted children and thus heirs of His blessed life.” How many lives would be changed if they took these words to heart?

All of us need more of God’s wisdom in our life, and probably less “information”. We take in so many things which don’t help us to be happier or to live better. The Catechism is full of Scripture verses and quotations of the saints throughout history. I propose getting a Catechism, and if you have one, opening it and reading it—especially the section on prayer which is a masterpiece.

Every Catholic should have the Catechism and read from it, since only the Truth, (and not information), can ‘set us free’.
