November 3rd Letter

Purification and Salvation, Our Path to God My Dear People,

November is the month when we remember in a special way those who have died, since November 2nd is All Souls' Day, or the Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed. The day preceding is the Feast of All Saints, where the Church celebrates all the saints in heaven, especially those who will never be publicly recognized. But All Souls' Day is about those who have died in God's friendship and are not yet in heaven, they are waiting to enter the vision and possession of God. They are not in hell, since they have been saved. Then where are they? In a 'place' or a state called Purgatory, where they are being cleansed and undergoing the final process of transformation to be worthy for heaven. So in November, we not only remember the souls who have died, but we pray for them, since our prayers can intensify and hasten the process of purification.

The Catechism explains it like this: "All who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven. The Church gives the name Purgatory to this final purification of the elect, which is entirely different from the punishment of the damned. This teaching is also based on the practice of prayer for the dead, already mentioned in Sacred Scripture: "Therefore Judas Maccabeus made atonement for the dead, that they might be delivered from their sin." (2 Maccabees 12:46) From the beginning the Church has honored the memory of the dead and offered prayers in suffrage for them, above all the Eucharistic sacrifice, so that, thus purified, they may attain the beatific vision of God. The Church also commends almsgiving, indulgences, and works of penance undertaken on behalf of the dead." (Catechism of the Catholic Church, paragraphs 1030 - 1032).

Salvation consists, not in a single choice of Faith that is made once and for all and cannot be revoked, but in living out daily God's pattern and plan for us to know, love and serve Him in Jesus. While the initial choice or act of Baptism is essential, the Christian life is rather one of a progressive transformation by God's grace and our cooperation with it, in order to become the person we need to be for heaven. This is why we have the seven Sacraments, that this transformation may be accomplished. But we can also hinder it by sin and lack of generosity, even if we're living in God's friendship. When we die and are not perfectly transformed. God is merciful. He allows us to continue it after death. But as on earth, this transformation is painful because it involves change. Therefore our prayers can and do help.

Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May all the souls of the faithful departed, through Your mercy, rest in peace. Amen.

From the desk of Fr. Walter

God's Hospital

My Dear People,

Last week I wrote to you that in the month of November we not only remember our beloved dead, but we also pray for them. Certainly, we should do this all year round, but we do so with special attention this time of the year because All Souls' Day falls on November 2nd. As autumn slowly fades the verdure of summer, the leaves fall, the days grow shorter and colder, and so our minds and hearts naturally turn to the things of eternity.

The Christian life is just that, a life, and not a single decision where no further effort of change is needed. It is a pilgrimage, a journey where, in and by God's grace and help, we "put on Christ", that is, we put to death sin and practice virtue. In Baptism, God plants in our souls the three Theological Virtues of Faith, Hope, and Love (or Charity). The work or "job" that God gives to every Christian throughout their whole life is to cultivate these three virtues so as to know and love God more deeply every day. Sin is a step backwards, or even off the path. Everyone knows that the initial consent of the marriage vows is not all that's required to make a successful marriage. It's not enough to merely say "I do" once; the "I do" must be lived out over a lifetime. It takes daily application to make the promise of that love and fidelity real. And it is precisely this living out of love that makes it grow into something much deeper than what existed at the start. So too our relationship with God. Most of us can admit that our love for God and neighbor isn't perfect; it could be better. God's mercy allows that if this transformation towards perfect love is not finished when our earthly life is over, the soul still has time. This is what Purgatory is all about. One catechism describes Purgatory as "God's hospital" - a place beyond this life where the wounds caused by our sins in this life can be healed so that the soul can become whole and healthy and beautiful for eternity. The best thing we can do to help those in God's hospital is to have the Mass offered for them. The Mass is the most powerful prayer since it is the prayer of Jesus Himself. At Mass, we always pray that the dead enter the Kingdom. In Eucharistic Prayer 1 we say: Remember also, Lord, your servants...who have gone before us with the sign of faith and rest in the sleep of peace. Grant them, O Lord, we pray, and all who sleep in Christ, a place of refreshment, light and peace.

It may well be that our loved ones are already in heaven and don't need our prayers anymore, which we certainly hope. But in case they do, we should pray for them. And above all, we should remember them at Mass, the most powerful and perfect prayer of all.
