When your donation is received, it is utilized immediately for current operations. The CMA supports offices, personnel and ministries that provide assistance and resources to parishes, pastors, parish ministers and Pastoral and Finance Councils through such offices as Safe Environment, Information Technology, Evangelization & Catechesis, Pastoral Services, Finance, Building/Property Management, Stewardship and Communications, the Tribunal and Risk Management. In fact, the CMA funds nearly 60 percent of the current diocesan operating budget in seven key areas:

• Serving the poor, the elderly and infirm through Catholic Charities

Providing diocesan-wide services to our parishes and institutions

From the desk of Fr. Walter The Mass and the Cross of Christ My Dear People,

The calendar year ends in less than two months, but the Church year ends in two weeks. You may notice that the readings for the last several weeks have focused on both the reality of death, the promise of the resurrection, and the ultimate coming of Christ at the end of the world. Next week we celebrate the Feast of Christ the King, the last Sunday of the Church year, before the season of Advent arrives. Advent reminds us of the time at the beginning of human history when the world awaited the coming of a Savior. But before the yearly cycle of grace begins anew, we must recall and reflect upon, not beginnings, but endings.

Last week I wrote to you about the importance of the Mass as an integral and essential way that we pray for our beloved dead. Why is this? Well, because the Mass is the most powerful and effective prayer; it is the prayer of Christ Himself that we have the privilege of participating in. What is central to our worship at Mass is not first what we do, but what Christ does. As in all the seven Sacraments, Christ is the ultimate One acting. The crowning masterpiece of the seven Sacraments is the Eucharist, where Christ is present, not only the moment that the Sacrament is enacted, but in a permanent presence through the outward appearance of bread and wine, but which is in fact His Most Sacred Body and Blood.

This Eucharistic presence comes from the Mass. What is the Mass? It is more than a meal where we remember what Jesus did some 2,000 years ago. It is the mystical, unbloody representation of His saving death on Calvary. You notice in the Eucharistic prayer that the priest constantly refers to the saving sacrifice on the altar. Earlier, he invites the people to pray saying: "Pray that my sacrifice and yours may acceptable to God, the Father Almighty". This sacrifice isn't our own, but the sacrifice of the Cross which we are given access to once again through the Liturgical action. But it becomes "ours" as we join ourselves, our lives, and our worship to the perfect sacrifice of Jesus. His sacrifice truly becomes "ours" because it was done "for us", to save us and forgive our sins. This is why Christ said, on the eve of His Passion, when the Mass was instituted, "This is my Body, given for you". The Mass is not a new sacrifice, but it makes present again mystically the sacrifice of our redemption.

Since the Mass is the Cross, it has all the saving power of the Cross to forgive sins and heal. And we apply this power for our beloved dead. May we see with the eyes of Faith the great "Mystery" which happens daily in our churches and recognize the One Who is both our beginning and our end.
