Living in Grace through the Sacraments

Sacrament of Baptism. We share in your joy as we welcome the newest member of your family into God's family, the Church. Our Parish offers Baptism Preparation Program to parents, with godparents, who wish to share their faith with their child. To register, please call the Parish Office.

Sacrament of Reconciliation. Persevere on the journey to holiness: Say "No" to sin and "Yes" to God's love, mercy and forgiveness: **Sunday's after Mass, at St. Mary Magdalene, before and after Mass at St. Thomas/St. Jude and on the 1st Tuesdays of the month at 6:30pm at St. Mary Magdalene** or call the Parish Office to make an appointment.

Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. Jesus continues his healing ministry through his Church. If you or any parishioner is ill at home, in the hospital or the nursing home, and desires to celebrate this sacrament of healing, call the Parish Office to schedule a visit.

Sacrament of the Eucharist. One of our priests will bring Communion during home visits or Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion (communion ministers) can and may bring you Communion regularly. Call the Parish Office.

Sacrament of Confirmation. Our young parishioners who wish to prepare to receive the gift of the Holy Spirit in the sacrament of Confirmation must be enrolled in a 2 year preparation program in Religious Education. Adults must call the rectory.

Sacrament of Marriage. You and your fiancé are called to mirror the love of Jesus for his Church! Please contact the Parish Office at least six months before the intended date of your wedding so we can help you prepare for this wonderful sacrament of committed love.

Sacrament of Holy Orders. Do pray for vocations to the ordained priesthood and permanent diaconate. It is our common obligation to raise vocations—ordained, religious, married, single—in the Church. Now do you happen to know if and when our parish has produced an ordained priest for our diocese?

Here for You... You Matter!

Here for You is a new outreach program which aims to connect willing, trained volunteers with Wayne County residents who are isolated due to age, illness, or disability.

Here for You strives to discover those who are isolated and who have needs which are not being met by family, friends, or agencies.

Here for You provides training, guidance, and support to volunteers who will go out to the homebound and isolated to offer them support and to enable them to connect with other organizations and agencies as well.

Here for You ensures that volunteers have a proper background screening and Safe Training as is appropriate in their work with vulnerable adults.

Here for You provides opportunities for the volunteers to gather on a regular basis for support, networking, training, and the sharing of best practices.

Here for You reaches out to the elderly, marginalized, homebound, and handicapped of all faiths and to those who have no religious affiliation.

Here for You works with all faith communities, civic organizations, and individuals by engaging, training, and equipping volunteers who are willing and ready to serve.

Here for You's volunteers ask nothing in return but the privilege of serving.

Role Description:

Here for You... You Matter is a program defined by its title. The two parts of the title express the dynamic between the volunteers and the persons they serve.

The first part of the title, Here for You, expresses the availability of the volunteer and the reality that, unlike what would be found in a precisely defined job description, the volunteer's primary role is to BE there for the homebound and isolated person. This is not to be interpreted as a limited, passive presence. Instead, the volunteer is challenged to be a companion, a friend, a listening ear, and an advocate. The volunteer, in fact, accompanies the homebound, isolated, or handicapped person on the path or journey that is their life in the present moment.

The second part of the title, You Matter, contains within it a challenge for the volunteer to not fall into the trap of merely seeing the person they serve as a consumer of services, or as a "case" to managed or controlled. In fact, in areas where the isolated person needs specific social services, the volunteer is asked to enable that person to connect with those agencies or organizations that already provide them rather than trying to duplicate those services. Rather You Matter presents a challenge and a charge to the volunteers to unflinchingly -- and joyfully! -- respect the dignity of each person they serve no matter how limited, disabled, or helpless that person is.

So, the volunteers for Here for You... You Matter are entering into a commitment to be truly present to the isolated persons they serve and to do so in a way that respects the dignity of each human person. A real challenge indeed but one that can be fulfilled with courage and commitment.

From the Desk of Father Walter:

My Dear People,

When someone tells you to be prudent, what does that usually mean? Be cautious, go slowly, or be careful? But when we hear the word "prudent" in the Bible, it means much more than to be careful or cautious. In fact, Biblical, or Christian prudence is a virtue, and it is a virtue that we need as much as an engine needs oil to run smoothly.

As we commonly use it, prudence often implies the very opposite of courage or daring; wouldn't we find it odd to call a fearless soldier "prudent"? Yet Christian prudence is not just a human quality, nor is it cautiousness, but it is "supernatural", meaning, something God gives to enable us to see and act beyond a merely human way. If it is a gift, like all gifts God gives us, we must cooperate and accept it so that it bears fruit. Furthermore, prudence is absolutely necessary for us to live a Christian life and follow Jesus. Why? Prudence inclines our intellect to choose in every instance the best means for achieving our goal of eternal life and salvation. Thus, we are helped to subordinate, or put in order, the things of our life towards that purpose. What does that mean? Prudence makes us truly wise, according to God's wisdom. We see things as they are in God's eyes and are enabled to go about the practical day-to-day living out of our Catholic Faith. Prudence aids us in seeing the persons, circumstances, and challenges of the real world as they really are. We also see and acknowledge ourselves as we are, not as we imagine ourselves to be.

Think about it for a moment. God gives us the general road signs on how to live in a relationship with Him by the 10 Commandments, and the teaching of the Church in Faith and Morals. But life is full of a thousand varied problems, obstacles, and factors which call for spiritual 'street smarts' on how to do what God wants, and what is best for us and others. We know we must love our neighbor, but how do we actually do that? Prudence shows us what the practical application of that love needs to look like.

When a Christian is truly prudent, he is playing to win and knows how to do it. But to obtain this prudence, we need to ask God for it- every day! Life comes at us whether we want it to or not, and many decisions have multiple and lasting consequences. Praying to the Holy Spirit for prudence opens our hearts and souls to receive, little by little, a spiritual sixth sense. Far from making us overly cautious, it gives us vision for wise choices which are enlightened by our Faith. Prudence will not make us tread slowly, but run, swiftly and surely, into God's arms.
