Living in Grace through the Sacraments

Sacrament of Baptism. We share in your joy as we welcome the newest member of your family into God's family, the Church. Our Parish offers Baptism Preparation Program to parents, with godparents, who wish to share their faith with their child. To register, please call the Parish Office.

Sacrament of Reconciliation. Persevere on the journey to holiness: Say "No" to sin and "Yes" to God's love, mercy and forgiveness: **Sunday's after Mass, at St. Mary Magdalene, before and after Mass at St. Thomas/St. Jude and on the 1st Tuesdays of the month at 6:30pm at St. Mary Magdalene** or call the Parish Office to make an appointment.

Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. Jesus continues his healing ministry through his Church. If you or any parishioner is ill at home, in the hospital or the nursing home, and desires to celebrate this sacrament of healing, call the Parish Office to schedule a visit.

Sacrament of the Eucharist. One of our priests will bring Communion during home visits or Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion (communion ministers) can and may bring you Communion regularly. Call the Parish Office.

Sacrament of Confirmation. Our young parishioners who wish to prepare to receive the gift of the Holy Spirit in the sacrament of Confirmation must be enrolled in a 2 year preparation program in Religious Education. Adults must call the rectory.

Sacrament of Marriage. You and your fiancé are called to mirror the love of Jesus for his Church! Please contact the Parish Office at least six months before the intended date of your wedding so we can help you prepare for this wonderful sacrament of committed love.

Sacrament of Holy Orders. Do pray for vocations to the ordained priesthood and permanent diaconate. It is our common obligation to raise vocations—ordained, religious, married, single—in the Church. Now do you happen to know if and when our parish has produced an ordained priest for our diocese?

FOR THE WESTERN DISTRICT OF NEW YORK**

**In re Diocese of Rochester
Case No. 19-20905**

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE THAT, On September 12, 2019, the Diocese of Rochester (“Diocese”) filed for protection under chapter 11 of title 11 of the United States Code (the “Bankruptcy Code”).

The Bankruptcy Court has established August 13, 2020 at 11:59 pm (prevailing Eastern time) as the deadline to file proofs of claim against the Diocese (the Bar Date”).

If you have a claim against the Diocese, including, without limitation, a claim related to sexual abuse committed by any person connected with the Diocese, you must file a claim on or before the Bar Date.

IF YOU DO NOT TIMELY FILE A PROOF OF CLAIM, YOU MAY FORFEIT YOUR RIGHT TO VOTE ON ANY PLAN OF REORGANIZATION AND TO SHARE IN ANY DISTRIBUTIONS MADE TO CREDITORS IN CONNECTION WITH THE DEBTOR’S CHAPTER 11 CASE.

From the desk of Fr. Walter:
My Dear People,

The increasing spread of the novel coronavirus has, within a few short weeks, drastically altered our every-day routines and lives. What is most frightening perhaps is the uncertainty it engenders; where will the next outbreak be, what will be cancelled next, what else is going to change? In addition to this is the very real concern about catching an illness that could result in death, our own or someone we love. Who is not disturbed by the fact that we are facing an infectious disease that can be spread before any symptoms appear?

But this very recent outbreak, now labelled pandemic, has in fact uncovered another disease, even more hidden, and far more deadly. This disease has been growing steadily, and in most cases completely unchecked in recent decades. Not unlike the coronavirus, it can spread without any apparent negative symptoms, but dissimilarly, it affects the young as much as the old. What is it? This sickness is to forget how short life really is, and how much we are in complete dependence upon God. This second sickness is uncovered by the first because, as things become more uncertain, and more lives may be at risk, whether or not people begin to think of the condition of their souls, whether they turn to God immediately, and whether they place more trust in God is quickly revealed. I say this second disease is more deadly because it has eternal consequences.

The ultimate purpose of our existence is not to try to live as long as possible no matter what and squeeze as much pleasure and comfort out of life as we can. We do, most certainly, have a responsibility before God to take care of ourselves. Likewise, the instinct to preserve life and avoid danger is healthy and a necessary part of being human. But as Christians we know that our real purpose is to live according to our identity as made in God’s image and to enter into a saving relationship with Jesus Christ. As the pandemic spreads, it has become painfully obvious how, in the Western World, the health of the body is of far more importance to us than the health of the soul.

Atheistic communism denied the afterlife, but quickly devalued all human life. The irony is, if we live only for this world, then even life below becomes worthless. But if we live for God, then life, be it long or short, is of far greater value. Putting our trust in God and putting the life of our souls before the body doesn’t mean we don’t get scared by what’s happening, nor does it mean we shouldn’t wash our hands, or take care of ourselves. It does mean, though, that we know God is our ultimate refuge, in this life and in the next. Maybe the coronavirus can help us. It will, if it makes us remember how fragile our lives are and how much we truly depend on God for everything.

Role Description:

Here for You... You Matter is a program defined by its title. The two parts of the title express the dynamic between the volunteers and the persons they serve. The first part of the title, Here for You, expresses the availability of the volunteer and the reality that, unlike what would be found in a precisely defined job description, the volunteer’s primary role is to BE there for the homebound and isolated person. This is not to be interpreted as a limited, passive presence. Instead, the volunteer is challenged to be a companion, a friend, a listening ear, and an advocate. The volunteer, in fact, accompanies the homebound, isolated, or handicapped person on the path or journey that is their life in the present moment. The second part of the title, You Matter, contains within it a challenge for the volunteer to not fall into the trap of merely seeing the person they serve as a consumer of services, or as a “case” to managed or controlled. In fact, in areas where the isolated person needs specific social services, the volunteer is asked to enable that person to connect with those agencies or organizations that already provide them rather than trying to duplicate those services. Rather You Matter presents a challenge and a charge to the volunteers to unfailingly – and joyfully! -- respect the dignity of each person they serve no matter how limited, disabled, or helpless that person is.

So, the volunteers for Here for You... You Matter are entering into a commitment to be truly present to the isolated persons they serve and to do so in a way that respects the dignity of each human person. A real challenge indeed but one that can be fulfilled with courage and commitment.

Here for You is a new outreach program in Wayne County that strives to connect persons isolated by age, physical limitations, or other handicaps with trained volunteers who can assist them in their needs.
