Sacrament of Reconciliation. Persevere on the journey to holiness: Say "No" to sin and "Yes" to God's love, mercy and forgiveness: Tuesdays at St. Mary Magdalene from 7 pm to 8 pm in the cry room or call the Parish Office to make an appointment.

Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. Jesus continues his healing ministry through his Church. If you or any parishioner is ill at home, in the hospital or the nursing home, and desires to celebrate this sacrament of healing, call the Parish Office to schedule a visit.

Sacrament of the Eucharist. Ministry suspended until after the pandemic.

Sacrament of Confirmation. Our young parishioners who wish to prepare to receive the gift of the Holy Spirit in the sacrament of Confirmation must be enrolled in a 2 year preparation program in Religious Education. Adults must call the rectory.

Sacrament of Marriage. You and your fiancé are called to mirror the love of Jesus for his Church! Please contact the Parish Office at least six months before the intended date of your wedding so we can help you prepare for this wonderful sacrament of committed love.

My Dear People,

You remember last week was the Feast of the Holy Trinity. I noted that, after all the mysteries of the life, death, resurrection and ascension of the Lord had been commemorated and celebrated, we were led up to the inner sanctum of God's own life: the mystery of One God in Three Divine Persons. The whole liturgical year, from Advent until this moment is like a beautiful ascent up to God through the life of Jesus our Savior. But let me ask you something: after the Feast of the Holy Trinity, after we have made this ascent up to God's secret life within Himself, to where are we led? To the Eucharist, to the Feast of His Body and Blood, *Corpus Christi*.

The Eucharist is truly the center of our Catholic Faith because Jesus Christ is the center of our Catholic Faith, and the Eucharist is Jesus. The mystery of this gift of love is that, by the words of consecration wherein the priest, acting in the place and in the Person of the Lord, speaks over the bread and wine the words that Christ Himself spoke at the Last Supper, no longer are they bread and wine, but are transformed in their substance to be the true Body and Blood of Jesus Christ. The 'substance' changes, meaning, what they are, even if the outward appearances remain, and if they look, taste, and feel like bread and wine. Christ did not say at the Last Supper this 'represents' My Body, or this 'symbolizes' My Body, but He used the word 'is'. In the 6th Chapter of the Gospel of John Christ teaches in advance about what He is going to do. He explains that, to have eternal life, we must both believe and receive His Body which will become true food for us. Many left when He said this because it seemed too outrageous or impossible. To this day, the teaching that the Eucharist is the Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity of Jesus is 'too difficult' for some people to believe. They say, like the crowds following Jesus who heard Him teach this, "This is a hard saying, who can listen to it?" (John 6:60)

However, the love and power of God are not limited to our very limited human understanding. Thank God for that! But it takes our own Faith to believe what Jesus proposes to us. For His power to be felt and experienced in our life, for Him to do the same sort of miracles we read about in the Gospel, He asks us as He did then: *Do you believe?*

In the long history of the Church, there are few saints with as poignant a story about embracing Eucharistic Faith as the American convert Mother Seton, or St Elizabeth Ann Seton (1774-1821). She was the foundress of the vastly successful teaching congregation, the Sisters of Charity. Born Episcopalian, she was drawn more and more to the Catholic Faith in spite of the strong anti-Catholic sentiment and bias at the time, especially among the upper class from which she came. When on a tour of Italy with her husband to cure his tuberculosis, she encountered the Mass and was in awe when she saw the elevation of the host. When back home and her husband finally died, she wrote, "My sister dear, how happy would we be if we believed what these dear souls believe, that they possess God in the Sacrament and that he remains in their churches and is carried to them when they are sick." She was tormented by the thought of how wonderful it would be if the Real Presence were true. "When they carry the Blessed Sacrament under my window [to bring communion to the sick]," she wrote, "I feel the full loneliness and sadness of my case. I cannot stop the tears at the thought. My God, how happy would I be even so far away from all so dear, if I could find You in the church as they do." Her love and belief finally overcame the objections of her family to convert to Catholicism and writing of her 'first Communion" she says: "At last Amabilia — at last. GOD IS MINE and I AM HIS, I HAVE RECEIVED HIM." Having lost her mother at an early age and then later her husband, Mother Seton felt the deep loneliness of being exiled from those she loved. God used this to lead her to embrace the solution He wants to give all of us who are actually exiled from our ultimate home heaven, the Presence of Jesus on our altars and in the tabernacle.

Many bad things have happened and are happening because of the coronavirus situation, but let's think of some of the purposes God is working in us in spite of, or perhaps, because of these. Our desire and gratitude for the Eucharist have grown. We take Mass and Communion for granted less, or we ought to. We are willing to adjust our schedules and our routines to meet Jesus in His Sacramental Presence. The list goes on.

From the Trinity back to the Eucharist, this is the glorious and life-giving circle of our Faith. What a masterpiece of divine goodness! What a mystery of God's love and care! What a hidden and inestimable treasure! What proof that God is closer than we think... and yet, what a tragedy if we do not realize this. But what an eternal joy when we do.
