PRAY FAST GIVE

A Message from Deacon Gregory Kiley

Other than kind of looking kind of like each other, what do the words Quadragesima, Carême, Quaresima, and Cuaresma have in common? Well, they are the Latin, French, Italian, and Spanish words for Lent. They all have the same meaning "Fortieth", that is the fortieth day before Easter. English actually uses a pagan word for the season of Lent. But, whatever language we speak, Lent is upon us. But, what is this Forty Day deal of Prayer, Fasting, and Almsgiving about anyway? We do know that Lent is a very ancient custom, although it has taken different forms and has had different rules throughout the ages. Many of us remember when the rules for fasting were much stricter than they are now. In the Eastern Orthodox churches, Lent means NO! No meat, no fish, no eggs, no milk, no cheese, no vegetable oil. WOW! So what's the deal about the number "Forty"? Throughout the Bible, we see the number forty used as a time of preparation and purification. The forty days of the Great Flood in the time of Noah purified the earth of sin and prepared a new, faithful people. Moses went up on the holy mountain and fasted for forty days to prepare for the giving of the Ten Commandments. When the people of Israel said they wanted to go back to slavery in Egypt, they had to wander in the desert for forty years to prepare and purify them so that they could enter the Promised Land. The Prophet Elijah fasted for forty days in order to be prepared for the mighty challenges of his prophethood that lay before him. In the Book of Jonah, the people of Nineveh were given forty days to repent in order to save their city from destruction. Now, here's the big one, Jesus fasted in the desert for forty days and was tested by the Devil in preparation for his Public Ministry. This story of Jesus' time in the desert is absolutely essential in understanding what Lent is about. Certainly, Lent is about repentance, about turning from our sins and being faithful to the Gospel. But... Jesus didn't have to repent. He was sinless! Here's where it all comes together: The Biblical principle of having a forty day, or forty year, or forty hour-long time of prayer and fasting is to prepare us for what is to come. For Jesus, that preparation did involve the titanic struggle of contending with and defeating the powers of evil but, for us, we cannot prepare for that battle without first repenting of our sins. That is why we begin Lent not with candy eggs and jelly beans but with ashes. "Turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel." Repentance is not a matter of feeling sorry for our sins but of leaving them behind and of choosing to walk the way of righteousness. Let us embrace Lent this year with determination and with purpose.

Indulgences for Year of St. Joseph

Pope Francis has announced special opportunities for plenary indulgences for the "Year of Saint Joseph" through Dec. 8, 2021. Indulgences are subject to the usual conditions: sacramental confession, reception of Holy Communion, prayer for the intentions of the Pope, and total detachment to all sin. Due to the pandemic, the Holy See made provision that persons who are currently unable to go to Mass or confession because of health restrictions may defer reception of those sacraments until they are able. Those who are sick, suffering, or homebound may also receive the plenary indulgence by fulfilling as much as they are able and by offering their sorrows and sufferings to God through St. Joseph.

The following prayers and activities have been enriched with a plenary indulgence:

- meditate for at least 30 minutes on the Lord's Prayer or participate in
- a retreat of at least one day that includes a meditation on St. Joseph
 perform a corporal or spiritual work of mercy, inspired by the life and example of St. Joseph

The 7 Spiritual Works of Mercy are:

Admonish the Sinner Instruct the Ignorant Counsel the Doubtful Bear Wrongs Patiently Forgive Offenses Willingly Comfort the Afflicted Pray for the Living and the Dead The 7 Corporal Works of Mercy are: Feed the Hungry Clothe the Naked Shelter the Homeless Visit the Sick Visit the Imprisoned Bury the Dead

• pray the Rosary together as a family or a couple, modeling the virtues of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph

dedicate with confidence their daily work to the protection of St. Joseph the Worker, including the efforts of those who are unemployed, underemployed, or seeking more dignified work
devoutly recite the Litany of Saint Joseph, especially for the intentions of persecuted Catholics in the Church and around the world, and for the relief of all Christians who suffer persecution or
devoutly recite another approved prayer to Saint Joseph, for example the "To you, O blessed Joseph" especially on various feasts of Saint Joseph: March 19 (his solemnity), May 1 (St. Joseph the Worker), the Sunday after Christmas (Holy Family), St. Joseph's Sunday (Byzantine Catholics), or on the 19th day of each month, or each Wednesday, traditionally dedicated to honor his memory with pious devotions.

Prayer Before a Crucifix

Behold, O kind and gentle Jesus, I kneel before you and pray that you would impress upon my heart the virtues of faith, hope, and charity, with true repentance for my sins and a firm purpose of amendment. At the same time, with sorrow I meditate on your five precious wounds, having in mind the words which David spoke in prophecy: "They have pierced my hands and my feet. I can count all my bones" (Ps 22).
