
Living in Grace through the Sacraments

The Baptism of Jesus

Even though the secular world has already moved on, over the last couple of weeks, we as a Church have continued to celebrate Christmas. Today marks the end of the Christmas season, and it ends with the celebration of the Baptism of the Lord. Today, we heard the story of how Jesus was baptized in the River Jordan by John the Baptist. After he was baptized, the Gospel says that the heavens opened up and a voice spoke in the clouds saying "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased."

Now, you might be asking, and with good reason, why the Baptism of the Lord is the feast day that ends the Christmas season? After all, the Christmas season deals with the story of Jesus' birth. Over the last couple of Sundays, we have been hearing stories of the beginning of Jesus' life, the events that occurred right before and right after he was born. But we know, of course, that Jesus was not baptized by John when he was a child. As we heard today, both John and Jesus, who were born within the same year of each other, are both adults when this scene takes place, which means that many years have passed from the time that Jesus was born.

The reason why the Church chose this event as the end of the Christmas season is actually a very simple one. It is because all of the Gospels agree that Jesus' baptism is the event that began his public ministry. Up until this time, he had been a man living in relative obscurity: no miracles, no sermons, no healings, etc. In many ways, it is this event that separates the private Jesus from the public Jesus. Remember, with the exception of a brief story in Luke about the 12-year-old Jesus in Jerusalem, there is nothing in the Gospels about Jesus' life from the time he is an infant until he is baptized and begins his public ministry as an adult. Thus, the Church uses this event as way to close the book on the Christmas season ("private" Jesus) and begin Ordinary Time (public ministry). From here on, the Gospel passages in Mass focus back on the ministry period of Jesus' life.

The Baptism of Jesus is important for more reasons than just ending the Christmas season. We know that the Baptism Jesus received is not the Baptism that Jesus handed down to his Apostles. Remember, John himself said that his baptism was only of water, while Jesus' baptism would be with the Holy Spirit. Not only that, but Jesus doesn't even need to be baptized. He is the author of Baptism, not a receiver of baptism. Yet, he still received this baptism by John. This action does two things: it shows how, even though he isn't a sinner, he still identifies with sinners (something he would do throughout his ministry); and his reception of Baptism would be the example that all of his disciples would follow until the end of time.

Baptism is the very first sacrament we receive as a member of the Church. It marks the beginning of our relationship with God, wipes away any sin that came before it, and is the only way for us to enter into heaven that we know of. In allowing himself to be Baptized by John, Jesus showed us the way toward salvation.

Prayer to St. Benedict Joseph Labré

St. Benedict Joseph Labré, you gave up honor, money and home for love of Jesus. Help us to set our hearts on Jesus and not on the things of this world. You lived in obscurity among the poor in the streets. Enable us to see Jesus in our poor brothers and sisters and not judge by appearances. Make us realize that in helping them we are helping Jesus. Show us how to befriend them and not pass them by. St. Benedict Joseph Labré, you had a



great love for prayer. Obtain for us the grace of persevering prayer, especially adoration of Jesus in the Most Blessed Sacrament. St. Benedict Joseph Labré, poor in the eyes of men but rich in the eyes of God, pray for us. Amen

• Do not click on links or open any attachment in email without verifying its authenticity.

• Use trusted sources such as legitimate government websites for information on COVID-19.

• Do not reveal any personal or financial information in email or over the phone.

• Do not respond to email solicitations.

• Verify a charity's authenticity before making a donation.

• Do not purchase gift cards based on an email you receive. Verify by phone call before spending your money.


