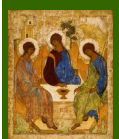

Fr. Mike's Message...

Thanksgiving

Now that we are about halfway through the month of November, we are quickly approaching my favorite time of year. Advent is quickly approaching, and with it comes preparations for Christmas. One of the reasons why I like this time of year so much is because of the secular holiday that kicks off the Advent/Christmas season: Thanksgiving.

Thanksgiving is, of course, a secular holiday, and not a religious one. It is supposed to commemorate the time when the first settlers from England came to North America and celebrated their first harvest, possibly with the local Native American tribes. Every year, we celebrate Thanksgiving on the fourth Thursday of November, about one month before Christmas.

But even though Thanksgiving is a secular holiday, its themes are quite religious. In fact, days of giving thanks are a tradition in many Christian traditions, both Catholic and Protestant. The notion of giving thanks for blessings, whether those blessings be for a meal, a harvest, or anything else, is a core tenant of Christian theology. Remember, the word Eucharist itself is the Greek word for thanksgiving. Every time we celebrate Mass, we give thanks for the Lord's gift to us of his very Body and Blood.

Most years, the Thanksgiving holiday is immediately followed by the First Sunday of Advent, beginning the new Liturgical year and beginning our preparation for the Christmas season to come. Because of its place on the calendar, the Thanksgiving holiday is a perfect way to kick off the holiday season.

As I mentioned before, giving thanks for one's blessings is a core principle of being Christian, and as such is something we need to be doing every day of the year, not just on thanksgiving. All of us have been given innumerable gifts from God, and we need to make sure that we give thanks to him for those great gifts every day of our life. But what is so nice about thanksgiving is that for one day, no matter where you are, no matter what walk of life, all people in the Country, even those who are not religious, are united together in giving thanks for the blessings that they have received, and that is a powerful witness to our Christian faith.

Advent Tree Tag Process

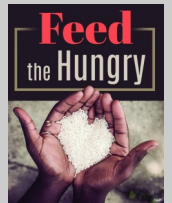

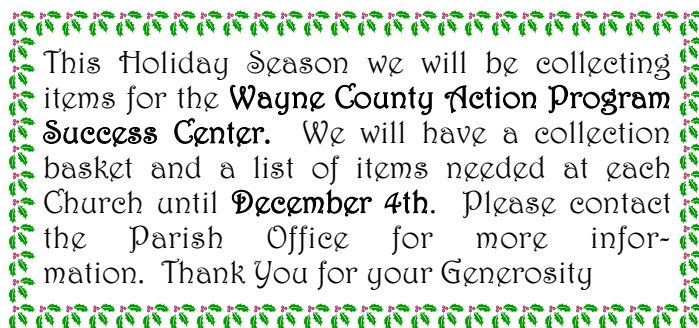

Building Strong Catholic Families

Children, while innocently naïve about most world events, are also profoundly sensitive to the concerns felt by adults. We can help children interpret adult concerns by sharing information about current events in appropriate ways. We can also put these concerns in the light of God's kingdom and the assurance of God's care for us. Discuss with your children one or more current events or a situation in your family which shows difficulties that may challenge our trust in a God who cares for us. Jesus said in the gospel that even when his disciples are persecuted, God would be with them. Together with your children, talk about ways in which God might bring good out of the difficult events you discussed. Talk together about some actions you might take as a family to make better the situations you discussed. Conclude by praying for the needs of the people involved in the events you named. In prayer, place each of these difficult situations into God's hands.

A Year of Coming to Know God

Adam and Eve, the first human couple, were created by God and, like everything God makes, they were good. So human nature is fundamentally good. It's a good thing to be a human being. Very good. Secondly, Adam and Eve were created like God. We're like God because we have intellect (intelligence) and will (freedom). God is intelligent and free, and so are we! Finally, we were made for God – for an eternal relationship with God.

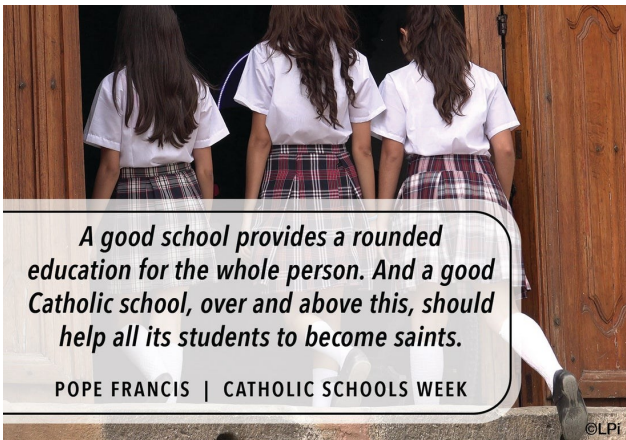

Eyes on your own Paper

*"Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom.
There will be powerful earthquakes, famines and plagues from
place to place."*

Looking at these words, I have to wonder. Am I reading the Bible
or today's newspaper headlines?

It's never easier to despair than when you glance up and take a
good look at what's going on in the world: disasters, natural and
contrived, wars, resentments, rivalries and divisions. It is almost
too much sometimes, isn't it? The twenty-four-hour news cycle
doesn't help. Add social media and it's enough to push anyone
into a nervous breakdown.

When you find yourself in this place of despair, remember Paul's
admonishment in his letter to the Thessalonians. Work quietly
and eat your food.

It's not so different from the old "keep-your-eyes-on-your-own-
paper" rule of the classroom. Poking our noses into other peo-
ple's business, we may think we are getting a shortcut to the
right answer, but we're really just getting distracted. When we
become too preoccupied with events that we cannot control—
whether they are happening in our neighborhood or half-a-world
away—we are tempted to leave off the very specific work God
had given us in our own lives. We are easily lured into anger,
bitterness and anxiety.

What is the work that God has called you to? Is it your career?
Your family? Your community? What is your food—what nourish-
es you, sustains you, connects you to something real, powerful,
and life-giving? This is what you should be concerned with. This
is where your thoughts and your efforts should be.

Work quietly and eat your food.
