A Eucharistic Revival!

By now, everyone has probably heard about the U.S. Catholic Bishops call for a Eucharistic Revival. So... What is it and why do we need it? There are many good reasons why we do but two of the most important ones are these: Recent polls show that many Catholics no longer believe in the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist. Wow! That's the big one. Also, in our increasingly "on-line" culture, many people who are capable of attending church have chosen to watch the Mass on television. This factor has greatly increased since the COVID-19 lockdown and has affected most non-Catholic churches as well. Folks will often feel that they can hear better music and sermons on T.V. than at their local church. But, here's the real question; whom do we worship? Our feelings? Our convenience or preference? No, we come to Mass to participate in the only act of worship instituted by Jesus Christ, the Son of God, who by His death and resurrection has brought us the hope of eternal life. Jesus calls you to worship Him at Mass. Jesus does. And what does He tell us? We turn to the Gospel according to John to hear His words:

"I am the living Bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this Bread will live forever; and the Bread that I will give is My Flesh for the life of the world." (John 6:51). Hearing a message about Jesus on television is a good thing but His *Real Presence* is found at Mass in the Blessed Sacrament. The Eucharistic Revival we are observing now is a challenge to all of us to grow deeper in our relationship with Jesus, to believe His every word, to follow Him every day, and to grow in holiness. Guess what? Only saints are in heaven! At his first Mass in Sacred Heart Cathedral, Bishop Matano asked us all this question: "What is a saint but anyone who has kept in constant communication with Jesus? This is what we're doing at Mass. We're communicating with Jesus through the Eucharist." Accept the challenge to become a saint from the One who died for you. He died for you and He offers you His Body and Blood at every Mass. Come, believe, and celebrate.

Children learn to trust God's mercy and forgiveness when they experience forgiveness from those closest to them. We hope that we model God's love and forgiveness within our family life. Today's Gospel reminds us that forgiveness is measured

by its quality more than its quantity.


Invite your family to consider some recent times when family members sought the forgiveness of another. Ask if there were any statements made that put conditions on our forgiveness such as "I will play this game with you if you apologize for knocking over my blocks" or "I will accept your apology after you clean up your room." Do we sometimes "keep count" or put conditions on our forgiveness of one another? This is something we may be doing without realizing it. Read together today's Gospel, Matthew 18:21-35. Ask if we sometimes find ourselves sounding like Peter, concerning ourselves with quantity of forgiveness rather than offering forgiveness abundantly and unconditionally. Reflect upon the parable that Jesus tells. What does the servant do that makes the king so angry? He refuses to forgive his fellow servant the debt that he owes. Because we have all received God's forgiveness, God expects that we will also be forgiving toward others. Jesus' answer to Peter's question is found at the end of the parable. The number of



times that we forgive one another is less important than the depth of our forgiveness. We must forgive one another from the heart.


Conclude in prayer together that God's love and forgiveness is evident in your family life. Pray together today's psalm, Psalm 103, or the Lord's Prayer.

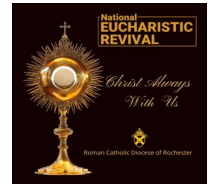

During the beginning of Mass, as the Entrance Procession approaches the sanctuary, the altar servers genuflect to the tabernacle along with the priest and deacon. If the altar servers are carrying the cross, candles, or a thurible, they make a simple bow of the head to the tabernacle. The priest and deacon kiss the altar. All the above actions are outward signs of reverence for Jesus, **who is present in the most Holy Eucharist in the tabernacle**. A reminder for us that Jesus is present in the tabernacle, is the sanctuary candle, which is suspended high up. Your outward sign of reverence for Jesus in the Tabernacle is a genuflection towards the tabernacle before you enter your pew (or seat). If you are unable to genuflect, simply bow your head towards the tabernacle. Our tabernacle is located directly in back and center of the altar, and is beautifully illuminated for everyone to see and revere. Sincerely, Fr. Felician
