On the fifteenth Sunday in ordinary time, we reflect on the parable of the Good Samaritan. In the gospel passage, we are told that as Jesus continues his journey to Jerusalem, he is confronted by a scholar of the law who comes to him with the intention of putting him to a test. In the gospels of Mark and Matthew, Jesus is asked about the greatest commandment. Here, in Luke's gospel, the lawyer asks what we must do to inherit eternal life. In the other two gospels, Jesus answers the question by quoting Deuteronomy 6:5, on loving God with all your heart and Leviticus 19:18, on loving your neighbor. Here Jesus asks the expert to answer this question, "what is written in the law?" The man is caught and responds with Deuteronomy 6:5. This verse is one of the most important prayers in Judaism, and it was said twice a day in Jesus' time. Love of God and love of neighbor are what is required for eternal life. Jesus'response is simple, "Do this and you will live". Having been shown up by Jesus, the lawyer tries another question: Who is my neighbor whom I must love like myself? In the society of Jesus' time, with its distinctions between the Jews and Gentiles, Men and Women, clean and unclean, this was a trick question. Jesus responds with one of the most beautiful of all the parable, the Good Samaritan. This parable is only found in Luke's gospel. In this parable, Jesus tells us that a man is attacked by robbers on the road from Jerusalem to Jericho. Three people happen to see this helpless man. Two are Jews and the other one is a Samaritan. The priest and the Levite who are Jews fail to help their fellow Jew but the Samaritan who is considered an enemy to the Jews is the one who shows him compassion. With this parable, Jesus has demolished all boundary expectations. It is not social definitions such as class, religion, gender, color, race or ethnicity that determines who is our neighbor. A neighbor is a person who acts with compassion towards another. The point becomes not who deserves to be loved as I love myself, but that I become a person who treats everyone with compassion.

#### (PRACTICING) CATHOLIC

Mini Reflections: As Christians we know that everyone is our neighbor. It's drilled into us from the first time we hear this reading. But do we approach the victims that we see? Or do we draw away from the suffering of others in fear and confusion, thinking: "That's not my problem"?

**Crossing the Street** 

It takes a cold, hard, godless heart to step over a wounded man on the street. But in the parable of the Good Samaritan, the priest and the Levite didn't step over the halfdead traveler. I think we picture them doing so, in our collective imagining of this well-known story, but the words of the Gospel are quite clear. "Then he saw him, he passed by on the opposite side" Jesus says of both.

So they saw him. They saw his need. It made them uncomfortable; it confused them - many scholars have said that Judaic law concerning the touching of dead bodies might have made them reluctant to approach - and so they decided the simplest way to file this situation in the Not My Problem category was to cross the street. But that still leaves a half - dead guy on the road. And we all, 2000 years later, still think of the priest and the Levite as cold and hard and godless - even if they didn't want to be, even if they didn't think of themselves that way - because the bottom line is, they didn't see the half-dead guy as their problem. As Christians we know that everyone is our neighbor. It's dilled into us from the first time we hear this reading. Well. I don't know about you, but I find myself crossing the street a lot more than I should.

There is so much pain and suffering in the world. We certainly can't begin to alleviate it all. But we have to start with the pain and the suffering that we see, that's right in front of us - even if it's something we really, really want to ignore. Even if we find it inconvenient or confusing or scary or weird.

The heroism if the Good Samaritan wasn't in his selfless actions, although those were certainly commendable. It

was in his courage. "He approached the victim," Jesus said.

Can we approach the victims we see? Do we have courage?

#### **Gospel Meditation**

#### **Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture**

I used to be a bad neighbor. I'd get wrapped up in my life and ignore those around me. Then I found sage advice from Benjamin Franklin to this effect: to be a better neighbor, ask someone to do a favor for you. It's counterintuitive, isn't it? Tell strangers that I need their help? Yuck. I'll risk looking needy. Worse, I'll be indebted to them. But I tried it, and it works like a charm. Recently I asked my neighbor Alan for a hacksaw, and Inga for an egg. They kindly obliged, and our friendship is growing.

This week we hear a scribe of the law cynically ask Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" (Luke 10:29). Like him, we prefer to keep the list of our "neighbors" as short as possible. It requires less interruption and inconvenience. But when Jesus tells the parable of the Good Samaritan, he exposes the lonely, cold-heartedness tendency of the scribe's (and our) heart. My "neighbor" is anyone I encounter who manifests a concrete need. There isn't time to require any other credential because human need opens us to the happy reciprocity which is love.

Jesus' words challenge us this week to ask a neighbor for help in some small way. How marvelous that God himself shows us how. He moves into our world and asks us to love Him with small deeds of love. Maybe that's where Ben Franklin got the idea.

BODY & BLOOD We continue our reflection on the Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. The meaning of sacrifice to people in bibli-

cal times is foreign to our culture and experience. A Jewish family coming to the Temple to offer sacrifice didn't bring gold, but something connected with life, such as a living aninal or fruits of the harvest. The sacrifice occurred when the priest put the fruits or blood on the altar, and the people made an internal offering of themselves. The most important part of the sacrifice was what happened in people's minds and hearts the offering of their lives to God. Jesus' death on the cross was the greatest of all sacrifices. Jesus made an offering of himself. The Mass is the free sacrificial offering of Jesus. The Mass is not trying to replicate either the ancient sacrifices of the temple ritual or the bloody event of Jesus' death. The liturgical actions performed by the priest at Mass are not a reenactment of the slaying of Jesus. The Lord could die only once; he will never die again. Rather, it's in celebrating this family meal, which we call the Mass, that we unite ourselves with Jesus' act of will and offer ourselves to God mirroring the self-dedication Jesus had when he died on the cross. "the sacrifice of Christ is unique; it completes and surpasses all other sacrifices. First, it is a gift from God the father himself, for the Father handed his Son over to sinners in order to reconcile us with himself. At the same time it is the offering of the Son of God made man, who in freedom and love, offered his life to his father through the Holy Spirit in reparation for our disobedience."
